Lewis Knudson – 50 years since his death.

The October 2008 issue of "Orchids", the bulletin of the American Orchid Society, has an article on Lewis Knudson (1884 – 1958), who is sadly not well known to most orchid growers. And yet, this American biologist has had an enormous influence on the cultivation of countless millions of orchids.

In the early years of interest in orchids, collections of wild plants was the usual method of obtaining plants for sale, due to the difficulty of germinating orchid seeds. Huge numbers of plants were gathered and sent for sale, usually to Europe, with large numbers dying on the long journey.

Noel Bernad had shown in 1909 that orchid seeds in nature required mycorrhizal fungi for germination, and out of this work a method was developed whereby a culture medium could be used and the fungus artificially introduced. Lewis Knudson had an interest in the pure culture growth of plants, which led him to the hypothesis that orchid seeds could be germinated without the presence of the mycorrhizal fungi but with sugars and starches. From 1919 to 1922, he developed several growing media, which eventually led to Knudson's C medium, which is still in use today throughout the world for the germination of orchid seeds and for micropropagation of orchids.

So, the next time you see a flask of orchid seedlings for sale, spare a thought for the hard-working biologist who made it all possible.

Did you know that one of the objects of the North Queensland Orchid Society Cairns is "The importation and resale of orchids to members'? In their November 2008 newsletter there is an article on *Miltonia spectabilis* containing general information and detailed growing information. If you are growing one, or more, of these you might like to compare notes.

Litchfield Orchid Club (Nov.08): Pity we didn't hear about their November meeting a bit earlier. They are having a wine tasting before the meeting. I can just imagine the motions and judging comments following a few bottles of red. [Oh, hello Dennis Fett.]

Orchids (The Bulletin of the American Orchid Society) (Nov.08): Their special report on Lumpers and Splitters: Cattleyas and Molecullar systematics is relevant in all areas of orchids. Although they do comment that, "The moral of this story is obvious. If someone "splits" your favourite genus into 17 new genera, don't dash out and change all the labels. Wait a few years."

Orchids also contains many fine photographs and interesting articles. One that caught my eye was about Growing and Flowering Orchids in a Terrarium. Now there is a challenge for someone.

Eastern District Orchid Society (Oct.08): They had a very successful spring show with over \$2800 in profit. What was more exciting was that their membership promotion resulted in nine new members, with three of them receiving free membership for the 2009 year.

The OS of NSW (Nov.08) espouses the benefits of daylight saving when their president reports, "Daylight saving gives us more time to work on our plants and most orchids love the warmer conditions."

Ipswich OS (Nov.08) has a colour centrefold where their plant of the night *Sc*. Lana Coryell 'Cheryl' and others are shown. They are introducing a new class, cultural achievement, to the plants table.

OrchidWiz – the Orchid database

we are happy to advise that we have recently installed the "OrabidWi-" to a second to the "OrabidWi-" to the "OrabidWi-" to the "OrabidWi-" to the second to the "OrchidWiz" database in the Society's computer. Our Librarian, Noel Grant, has been entrusted with assisting all members who wish to access this very useful tool. You can now, for instance, check the name of your newlypurchased orchid, find out who the hybridizer was, journey back through the lineage (often with photographs of the parent plants, the grand-parents, the great grandparents etc) back to the original species, and check how many of this orchid has been awarded.

For species orchids, the database includes very useful information about the habitat in the origin country, as well as advice on cultivation, feeding, light levels etc.

Be sure to tap Noel on the shoulder and ask him for a guided tour of the OrchidWiz database very soon. He is keen to show it off.

Registrar's Choice for hybrid was *Den*. Vimalamitra owned by F and D Marnock and gained 81 Points. This dendrobium



was first registered in 1999 from the crossing of *Den*. Thongchai Gold and *Den*. Palolo Sunshine.

Paphiopedimum lowii owned by L Kennedy and F Ames, 79 points, gained the Registrar's choice for species.



Paphiopedilum lowii (Lindl.) Pfitzer 1895 grows at altitudes of 200 to 1700 metres and hails from Malaya, Sumatra, Java, Sulawesi and Borneo. Many, many awards have been given to clones of this species orchid. One notable plant was Paph. lowii 'Exotic Dancer' which gained an FCC/AOS (93 points) in 1989. This particular clone had nine flowers on two inflorescences. The flowers had a spread of 15.4 cm. By 2006, the clone 'Haley Suzanne' with four flowers (spread of 18.6cm) and one bud on a single inflorescence, gained an AM/AOS with 83 points.
