Novice New Growers' Report

Once again our usual monthly meeting of the Novice New Growers Group was held in the Townsville Orchid Society Inc. Hall on the 28th June with 49 members and visitors in attendance. The guest speaker for the day was Greg Kelly who spoke about his ideas on how he grows his Equitant Oncidiums (Tolumnia). Greg explained that they originate mainly from around the Caribbean Islands and Brazil and the habitat in which they are grown. They enjoy strong sunlight and high temperatures (28 – 33°C.) and they receive regular rain and high humidity in summer – in winter they receive less rain but get a little bit of moisture round the base from dew and mist, so basically they get wet - dry out and wet again. Greg likes growing Equitant Oncidiums because of the challenge to growing them well and because they are not a large plant, he can fit more of them in his greenhouse. He has experiment with many types of potting mixtures, but is presently trying a coconut bark mixture about 10 – 15mm size loosely potted in 80mm pot with some small gravel on top to stop the pot from overturning and also uses a bread try to keep them upright and tidy. He has 70 percent shade cloth on his greenhouse, but on the 1st October through to Anzac Day he places a 90 percent sleeve directly above the plants to give them more shade, he cannot honestly say what it does, but the most important thing is it makes me feel good if nothing else.

<u>Watering</u> to Greg is critical and you must water to your own conditions, the way I grow them is to water them – they have good drainage – they dry out and I water them again. In spring when the heat is high and humidity is low, I will water daily, other times twice a week depending on the conditions. Spring and summer he waters in the afternoon so as to give the plant a chance to take in some moisture before they dry out.

<u>Fertilisers</u>:- Wuxal, Aqua K, Aqua Grow and a seaweed solution on a rotation basis.

<u>Pesticides:-</u> Procide as a systemic insecticide and Agri-phos as a fungicide also his ideas on when he repots (size of pots), and when to repot (Spring) and how frequently (every two years).

Thanks Greg for sharing with us your knowledge, expertise and your time in formulating this programme for the Novice Growers Group.

Our thoughts and best wishes go out to Heather Cannon, Peter Lewis and Min Korsman who are not enjoying the best of health at the present time, also to Mary and Alf, hope to see you all back soon. Congratulation to Frances Maltby who was 1st in the Popular Vote section for the Novices and Neita Coulson 1st & 2nd with Noel Grant 3rd in the Open. Please remember to bring along your flowering plants for our next meeting. We would like to thank everybody for their wonderful support to the afternoon tea table and your generous donations for the Multi Raffle Table as your support is greatly appreciated. Any problems that you may be having with your orchid plants (repotting, pests or disease) please don't be afraid to bring them along to our meetings as we are

only to willing to help you with any problems that you may have.



pH and Your Orchids. Following on from Noel's article last month, I have dug up

an often quoted diagram (apologies for the quality) showing how plants change their uptake of various nutrients as the pH changes. Although it refers to plants in the soil, I am sure it is just as relevant to orchids as well. It poses the questions, "What is the pH of the fertiliser solution you are using?" and "Should you be testing, and altering the pH of your fertiliser.

"What is the pH of the fertiliser solution you are using?" and "Should you be testing, and altering, the pH of your fertiliser on a regular basis?".



The following text may help you to understand the diagram.


Diagram of the effect of soil pH on nutrient availability (and element toxicity). The width of the horizontal bars represents the availability of elements at any given pH. Most agricultural soils will be slightly acidic (pH 5.5 to 6.5). Redrawn from Atwell et al. (1999) in Plants in Action: adaptation in nature, performance in cultivation, Macmillan. Highly acidic soils may have adverse effects on plant growth due to aluminium toxicity. Alkaline soils may result in iron and manganese deficiency. Sources of iron and manganese applied to alkaline soils may rapidly become unavailable to plants, therefore foliar sprays are often used to correct these deficiencies in turf grown on alkaline soils.




