## **NOVICE/NEW GROWERS' REPORT**

After several overcast days and cool nights, the afternoon's meeting for this group on the 26<sup>th</sup> May turnout to be a bright sunny day. There were 55 members present who enjoyed the afternoon's programme. A short discussion on Phalaenanthe Dendrobium and how to treat these plants over the winter months, as this is considered to be their dormant cycle of growing. The removal of flower spikes by the month of May, all kinds of fertilising to be withheld and your watering programme to be curtailed until the new plant growth appears in September. This also applies to your Dendrobium bigibbum orchids as well. We then had the privilege of Jeff Knowles talk on how trying to solve a mystery puzzle concerning some of the Bulbophyllum Orchids that they had purchased and now since they have flowered what was their correct naming in the first place. At the meeting, Alison and Jeff had a wonderful display of several flowering plants such as Bulb. fascinator and longisimum which are the known parents of Bulb. Fascination, one of the first Bulbophyllum hybrid which was officially registered in 1936 also the Bulb. rothscildianum and ornatissimum. Thank you Jeffrey, for researching all the information for us on this subject. Another interesting plant was the large Schomburgkia that a visitor brought along to our meeting as this person wanted to know how to cut it up for repotting. This genus is related to Laelia and Cattleya, these vigorous epiphytic orchids are of two kinds, some have two leaves, spindle-shaped (fusiform) psuedobulbs, others have hollow psuedobulbs with three or more leaves. The upright flower spikes can grow up to 900mm. tall, and as explained by Peter are often inhabited by ants and not forgetting Noel's effort in dividing up this plant for our visitor.

Don't forget about the Dendrobium and Phalaenopsis seedlings for our growing competition we need to take measurements each month to see how well you are growing these plants for us. All the members who bring along their plants each month for the Popular Vote Competition are to be congratulated for their efforts and the results in the Novice Section were Peter & Joanne Lucke 1<sup>st</sup>, Joanne Tracey 2<sup>nd</sup>, with Wendy van Den Dolder & Peter &Joanne Lucke tied for 3<sup>rd</sup> place. The Open Section results were as follows: June & Stacey Cairns 1<sup>st</sup>, Luz Lewis 2<sup>nd</sup> and Neita Coulson 3<sup>rd</sup>.

The Society's Bus Trip down to Bowen for their Field Day was a great success and to be sure a wonderful day was had by all. Excellent hospitality and great bush housing for all to see made for many an overcrowded box of plants, and the bus compartment full as we journeyed home a bit light on in our pockets. ## In Noel's Bush House 15



Laelia rubescens

### Laelia rubescens (Lindley 1840)

This popular orchid comes from Mexico and neighbouring Central American countries. It has a wide variety of colour forms – from the typical pink shades to plain white. Some of the brightest pink types with the best form come from the state of Oaxaca, Mexico (for those learning Mexican, Oaxaca is pronounced 'washaca'). All have the distinctive dark maroon patch towards the base of the lip. 'Rubescens' means 'rosytinted'. Since it was named in 1840, Laelia rubescens has been given a large number of other names (now called synonyms), because of the variety of colour forms, which has tricked many botanists into thinking they have discovered a new species. It has tricked orchid buyers, too! A few years ago, I bought a plant of Laelia acuminata, not realising the name was a synonym until I researched it. When I bought that plant, I had not heard of the name, and thought "Aha, it's a rare Laelia. You beauty!" Laelia rubescens is a typical Mexican laelia which likes sunshine, good air movement and a definite dormant period in winter (after flowering). I used to own three different colour forms of this orchid, but I lost two through not remembering to keep them on the dry side after flowering. They rotted because I gave them too much water.

The plant is easily recognised, having smooth, shiny pseudobulbs which are somewhat compressed and oval-shaped. There is one leaf and a long (up to 50cm) narrow flower spike with up to 7 flowers. Interestingly, it is known to close the flowers at night.
