

Wal Nicholson

At a recent meeting of the TOS Inc. it was decided, now Wal Nicholson has resigned as president due to ill health, we should give him some recognition for all the good things he has done for the Society over many years. A couple of us have got together, and with reminders from Wal, we have put together the following:-

Wal, together with his wife Jean, joined the society in 1983 just about the same time that we hosted the Australian Orchid Council annual conference and show, which was the first time such a conference was held outside of a capital city. Within a very short period of time after joining the society, a matter of weeks, Wal was appointed Senior Vice President and has been on the committee ever since, except for a short period of 2 years (not of his making which we will discuss further). Previously their son Stephen had been a member of the Society and reached the position of Assistant Secretary.

Within 3-4 years of joining, Wal served as President for a few years. About this time, we were offered the opportunity to purchase the South Townsville Junior Rugby League's clubhouse in Pioneer Park. The proceeds we had made from the conference enabled us to do this with a loan, which Wal was able to arrange and for which he, along with three others, were guarantors. This loan was paid off in a relatively short time. Subsequently, Jean became President and held that position when we hosted the sixth Asia Pacific Orchid Conference. Wal was later chairman of the International organising committee, with Jean as his Secretary, as well as Secretary of the Society and the conference netted us a profit of approximately \$39 000. This enabled us to go ahead with extensions to the hall which Wal had been pushing for a few years and for which he had prepared plans and specifications, ready to proceed.

About this time, the Thuringowa Council decided to establish what is now known as Riverway and they wanted the land upon which our clubhouse sat. The land belonged to the state government but was managed by the council, the same as our present block. The only difference is that we had a 30-year lease there, now we only have 20. Wal was heavily involved in all of the negotiations with the Thuringowa Council to obtain compensation, or to have what they offered increased. For this to be achieved he, with a couple of other members, had to attend meetings of the Thuringowa Council to put our case forward. We won one and lost one.

It took the council 2 years to be able to provide us with a block of land which we considered was the best of what they had offered. Wal then arranged the drawing up of plans and specifications and, with the assistance of a couple of other members, was able to secure the services of the builder. However, the compensation was \$50 000 short of the tender. We used our reserves and were able to borrow \$20 000 to finish the deal. This money was able to be repaid in a relatively short period, in view of hiring the hall and profit from shows. Subsequently, Wal arranged an extension of the hall on the south-western corner. He then proceeded to arrange for solar panelling on the roof for which he procured a grant from the gambling community benefit fund for half of the job.

Wal and Jean and several others were rewarded by being granted Life Membership. It is interesting to note that Wal and Jean are the only members to ever hold the three top executive positions – President, Secretary and Treasurer- each of them separately.

In all, Wal compiled and submitted, with letters of support from various politicians and councillors, 3 such successful grant applications, totalling in excess of \$18 000 each. These grants were used to provide the kitchen facilities, the computers, the tables & chairs, Air-conditioning, and a few other miscellaneous items. While all of this was going on, Wal took control of all maintenance of the building, together with Hall Hiring. He also arranged several shipments of bark from South Australia. With one such shipment he took his Rodeo Ute to Brisbane supplementing the bark with goods from Garden City Plastics and from Fernland in Nambour – what a trip!!

He carried out the duties of President with Jean as Secretary, filling that position for more than 14 years. He has given up with reluctance but, in view of the speed with which he seems to be recuperating, we can expect to see more of him.

We have asked Wal the following four questions, which will be answered A.S.A.P over the coming months. How Wal became interested in orchids. 2. How his collection has grown. 3. How many orchid awards he has gained. 4. How many years Wal has won Annual T.O.S. Inc. Competition. And I am sure there are many other orchid stories, for example his trips covering World Orchid Conferences every four years, all over the world.

Thank you Wal, without your efforts, and those of Jean, the Society would not be what it is today. Fred, Ray & Coy.

We thank Delia for her time and expert knowledge on this subject and it is always a pleasure to have her talk to the members at our meetings. Jeff also gave a short summary of the correct way to write names on labels for species orchid. To all our members who are not well at the present time, especially Wal and Olive who are both in hospital and to Ray, we can only hope and pray that there will be better days ahead for all of you in the near future. The meeting concluded with a delightful and enjoyable afternoon tea supplied by the members and the drawing of the Multi Raffle. P.S. The support from our members in relation to the donation of food and prizes on the day was fantastic and it was also pleasing to have a few new shade houses to visit and I have to congratulate them for their efforts. In Noel's Bush House 50

Cattleya loddigesii var. alba "Angelique" Lindl. 1826

This is the albino form of the lovely *Cattleya loddigesii*, which is usually a clear pinky- purple, with a white lip which has a dash of the main colour at the tip. I was very happy to see it in flower, (this is its first blooming) because it is generally recognised that orchid color variants, whether alba, coerulea, semi-alba, aquinii or whatever, are generally the result of population isolation and in-breeding mutations. This tends to make these orchids show some of the other traits that one might expect from in-breeding such as growing poorly, low fertility or other symptoms of weakness. If you purchase an alba orchid, or other color variant, be aware that the plant may have the potential to be more finicky, and you should keep a close eye on the growth and care of your plant.

Cattleya loddigesii was named for Mr. George Loddiges, a 19th Century plant collector and nurseryman – one of his better known horticultural endeavours was to establish the world's largest hothouse in his Hackney Botanic Nursery. He invented a system of warm mist-like rain to maintain beautiful tropical palms, ephiphytic orchids, ferns and camellias in almost perfect environmental conditions similar to a tropical rainforest, creating a sensation in England at the time.

Cattleya loddigesii is found in parts of the Brazilian states of São Paulo, Rio de Janeiro, and Minas Gerais. The habitat extends from near São Paulo northward to the vicinity of Passos and westward to the region around Bauru. Plants grow at 610-910 m along the Rio Grande, Rio Tiete, Rio Pardo, and Rio Feo, and in the swampy regions near the headwaters of these streams. Plants are also found in swampy areas of the headwaters of the Rio Paraiba in southeastern São Paulo. It is closely related to Cattleya intermedia, for which it is often mistaken.

Loddigesii, according to most sources, is pronounced "lod-i-jis-ee-eye". However a respected local grower says that Mr. Loddiges is likely to have pronounced his name "lod-jis" (Lodges), so I say "lod-gis-ee-eye" when talking about this orchid. What do you think?

I am very happy with the full, round form of this bloom, and I am looking forward to the flowering of my plant next year, when I hope for more than one flower.



Part 1: Species Orchid Names

As a group of people who have an interest in orchids, we undoubtedly want our orchid communication to be as unambiguous as possible. One such technique is to ensure that the names on our orchid tags are accurately and correctly written.

Species orchid

Before we consider how the names of species orchids should be written, it is worthwhile clarifying what a species orchid actually is. To summarise its characteristics,

- · An orchid that grows naturally in the bush / jungle / etc.,
- That has only bred with its own "kind",
- But it can be grown and propagated in backyard bush houses,
- But, no crossings with orchids other than its own species is allowed.

For example, if you had two different plants of *Dendrobium discolor* growing in your bush house and you made a cross between them (shown below), then all the little offspring would also be species orchids, namely *Dendrobium discolor*.



Dendrobium canaliculatum is a species orchid as is *Den. discolor*, but if you were to cross these two with each other, then the resulting offspring would not be a species orchid.

Naming

Now back to the process of naming our species orchid. The following simple summary should help.

- 1. Each species orchid has a generic name or first term
 - for example, Dendrobium
- 2. And it has second name or a specific epithet
 - for example, discolor
- 3. When put together the two terms combine to form the specific name of the species
 - · for example, Dendrobium discolor

Once it is accurately named, then it comes time to correctly write its name. The rules are,

- 1. Its name is always written in italics or underlined
- 2. The generic name always begins with a Capital letter, with the remainder in lower case letters
 - for example, Bulbophyllum
- 3. The specific epithet is written with a small first letter
 - for example. Bulbophyllum rothschildianum
 - even when it is derived from a personal name e.g. sanderae.

Quite often there exists a distinctive race or population within a species. This requires the orchid's name to be further enhanced. Hence,

- 1. A varietal epithet (possible third term) is given to a distinctive race or population within a species.
- 2. It is preceded by the abbreviation var. (for variety) or subsp. (for subspecies) written in Roman letters.
- 3. It is in italics or underlined without a capital
 - for example, Dendrobium bigibbum var. bigibbum, as compared to,

Dendrobium bigibbum var. compactum.

To (almost) complete the picture. Imagine you have a very nice species orchid and a very nice wife and you would like to dedicate this particular plant to her. Yes, you can earn heaps of Brownie points by following these steps,

- 1. A special clone of a species may be given a cultivar epithet.
 - · for example, Den. discolor 'Nancy'
 - · or Den. bigibbum var. compactum 'Darandwil'
- 2. It is written in Roman letters, with a Capital and has 'single' quotes.

Please note that this cultivar epithet only applies to this particular plant (and mericlones of it), not to the other *bigibbums* or *discolors* you have growing in your lemon tree, and maximum Brownie points will only be gained if its flowers are in fact rather nice.

Reality.

This completes the theory, but what happens in reality? Imagine you have just returned from the

Townsville Orchid Spectacular in June 2017

where you purchased a species orchid with this tag. What should you do?

Step 1 is to check its name. If you have access to a computer you can go to the "horse's mouth" so to speak, and log on to the "World Checklist of selected plant families" at Kew by using the address

When you do this you will (or should) be at the search page.

Simply type in the orchid's name,



Which you will notice is saying that *Bulbophyllum burfordiense* is not its correct name. It is just a synonym for its correct name, which is *Bulbophyllum grandiflorum*. By clicking on this name you are taken to its name page,

Step 2: Now that you have its correct name, all you have to do is write out its new name tag and put it in the pot.



By doing this with all your species orchids, and I stress that the preceding explanation refers to species orchids only, you will have a well organised, accurately named collection.
