Finding an orchid name.

Recently I won a plant in the raffle. It was named Blc Chai Lin x Tubtim Siam. I later checked to see if the cross was named on Orchidwiz. There was no record of Tubtim Siam. I searched further on Orchidwiz but failed to find a plant to match Tubtim Siam. I repotted the plant and put it in the greenhouse. Recently I found that the plant had thrown a new growth which was big compared to the size of the plant.

I went back to the computer and made a number of partial searches and found the plant Rlc Tubtim Savam. Further checks revealed that this plant was also known as Tabtim Sayam but the correct name was Rlc Tab Tim Sayam. This plant crossed with Rlc Chai Lin results in the orchid being named Rlc Petch Tha Cheen which was registered in 2012.

I had presumed that the word Siam was correct and Tubtim was not. It seems both were wrong. Now I have a correctly named plant (thanks to OrchidWiz) which is growing very well. Greg Kelly

"to Grow or not to Grow"

How often have we stared at our beloved and diverse orchid collection and pondered this same question?

We water them (sometimes in Townsville anyway), shade them, fertilise them, re-pot them, spray them with a myriad of chemicals. and – I have known plants that have been pampered with a dose of classical music, and "heaven forbid" the odd profanity gets sent in their direction. We do this in a variety of ways as we attempt to grow and flower our orchids to their best.

But - is there something missing? Is there something we should concentrate on right from the start? Consider the following:

New arrivals there certainly were, — the collections of Warszewicz, for example, - but these were almost entirely formed in *cool* districts, and therefore perished under *hot* treatment nearly as rapidly as they were received. So great, indeed, was supposed to be the difficulty of succeeding with plants of this description, that collectors declined to purchase the most beautiful *Odontoglossa*, merely because they despaired of being able to grow them! And yet, as we now find, all that was required was to place the Orchids of cool countries in houses in which the temperature was not higher than that to which they had been habituated in their native wilds. It seems incredible that so obvious a principle should have been steadily ignored for more than twenty years; yet so it was! The accidental circumstance of our first Orchids having been coast or riverside plants, or denizens of the warm islands of the East and West Indies, leading as it necessarily did to *hot* treatment, had induced the notion that under no other system could any tropical Orchids be grown; and hence the ill-success that attended all our attempts to deal with the Orchids of the stove. But now, happily, the irrational prejudice that clung to us so long has entirely disappeared, and with it the difficulty of growing a most charming section of the Orchid family.

It is probable that a greater number of fine species amenable to "cool treatment" than has ever been gathered together in our "hot" Orchid-houses; and thus cultivators have much novelty and pleasure yet to anticipate.

So maybe that is it. If we understand where our orchids originated from, maybe we could duplicate those conditions for them. Just a thought.

Oh, I guess I should mention that the extract above was part of the preface in "A Second Century of Orchidaceous Plants" edited by James Bateman in 1867 in London. Maybe we are a bunch of slow learners after all ⁽²⁾

Bulbophyllum mastersianumⁱ

Introduction

Having your orchids flower to perfection is one of the satisfying moments of any orchid grower, but the growing of orchids has so much more to keep the "old grey matter" ticking over. An investigation into the history of an orchid is one such endeavour.



Our plants

We purchased a seedling flask of *Bulbophyllum mastersianum* 'yellow' at the Australian Orchid Council (AOC), Conference and Show held in Mackay in September, 2015 and they began flowering in January, 2018.

At the January meeting of the Townsville Orchid Society, we tabled one of our *Bulbophyllum mastersianum* plants on the first flowering table. This species is not seen very often in Australia and is yet to receive any awards from the AOC, although it has been awarded overseas.





Discovery and Description

Bulb. mastersianum was first "introduced to cultivation by Messrs. Linden, of Brussels, with whom specimens first flowered in 1890."ⁱⁱ.

It was later that year that it was formally described by R. A. Rolfeⁱⁱⁱ when he wrote in *Lindenia*^{iv}, "Here is a charming *Cirrhopetalum*, introduced this year from the Dutch Indies by M. M. Linden, Horticulture International, Leopold Park, Brussels. It is allied to *C. gamosepalum* Griff., but it is easily distinguished by various characters, and as I could not identify it with any species previously described, I think I can consider it as new, and dedicate it, according to the desire of M. M. Linden, to Dr. Maxwell T. Masters^v, the eminent director of the Gardeners' Chronicle." The published description was accompanied by a coloured plate (See Fig. 1).

Rolfe also wrote in June of 1890, "Today I am sending you an inflorescence of a *Cirrhopetalum* that we introduced in 1890 from the Dutch Indies, and which seems to me new *Cirrhopetalum mastersianum*."^{vi} with a sample sent to Kew. (See Fig.2)

Discerning readers may have already noticed the somewhat interchangeable nature of the terms *Bulbophyllum* and *Cirrhopetalum* so far in this article. When first described by Rolfe in 1890 this orchid species was classified as a *Cirrhopetalum*. Over the ensuing years, debate raged as to whether the orchids "separated by Lindley in 1824 and by Reichenbach1861"^{vii} should be maintained. Finally, in 1912 J J Smith in *Bulletin du Jardin Botanique de Buitenzorg* published a reclassification, naming our East Indian orchid *Bulbophyllum mastersianum*.^{viii}

But why mastersianum?

Rolfe followed the wishes of Linden and named this species after M T Masters. But how did he get "mastersianum" from this? He simply followed the accepted and stated rules for the naming of species orchids as now stipulated in the "International Code of Nomenclature for algae, fungi, and plants."^{ix} The relevant information is contained in Recommendation 60C1 which begins, "When personal names are given Latin terminations in order to form specific and infraspecific epithets, formation of those epithets is as follows".

The following part that is relevant here is, "(d) If the personal name ends with a consonant, adjectival epithets are formed by adding -*i*- (stem augmentation) plus -*an*- (stem of adjectival suffix) plus the nominative singular inflection appropriate to the gender of the generic name (e.g. *Rosa webb-iana* for Webb, *Desmodium griffith-ianum* for Griffith, *Verbena hassler-iana* for Hassler)." Clear as mud?

Let us break this down and proceed one step at a time.

Step 1. The convention exists that if the person after whom the species is being named has had some connection to the orchid, then the adjectival epithet is used. Rolfe used this interpretation.

Step 2: As the personal name, in this case Masters, ends in a consonant the adjectival epithet is formed by adding "i" and then "an".

Step 3: Luckily for us in this case, both genus names, *Cirrhopetalum* and *Bulbophyllum*" have the same gender - neuter^x.

Step 4: We now add the nominative singular inflection appropriate to the gender of the generic name. Thus we add "um", for neuter.^{xi}

Final step: Combining all this (Masters + i + an + um) we end up with the name of this species orchid as *Bulbophyllum mastersianum*. This is still the accepted name of this species orchid.

Conclusion

We have now concluded our journey that began in 1890. *Bulbophyllum mastersianum* is an easy to grow, colourful species orchid that can find a place in your collection and hopefully when displayed in all its glory, you will see it in a new light.

Professor Rapee Sagarik, Thailand's leading horticulturalist and Thai orchids expert, passed away at his home in Bangkok on February 17. He was 95.

The well-respected scholar, who has been recognized as the father of Thai orchids, died after suffering from blood infection for over six months. Professor Rapee was a pioneer in the breeding and conservation of Thai orchids, making them known worldwide. He wrote several books and articles, mostly about agriculture and orchids.

Among the many orchids he bred and named are: Vanda Sagarik (*V. sanderiana* x *V. miniata*) and Vandachostylis Sagarik (*Rhy coelestis* x *V. curvifolia*). He also had many orchids named after him, such as Van. Sagarik Wine (*V. denisoniana* x *Rhy. gigantea*).

He will be missed.
