- Question from C. Stout as to why the 75th Celebration venue was posted on a personal Facebook page when this information was not on TOS website which stated that the venue was still being discussed. These comments became personal in nature and the discussion was terminated.

- Novice Section: Oncidium Unknown owned by Andrew Hamilton

Technical Advisor: Charlie Truscott

- Discussion held around pH of tap water, 7.1 at Wulguru, 8.0 at Rosslea, Cungulla high alkaline
- To get extra out of orchids, consider adjustment of pH of water not just when fertilising
- Check pH, if down around 5 or 6 affects availability of trace elements, calcium, magnesium, iron, need to adjust to improve
- How to adjust? Charlie showed measurement device, need to calibrate first to 7 using provided solution, preference for 6.5 reading before usage, can purchase pH buffer from Bunnings usually add 5 to 10 mls, get as close to 6.5 as possible, yellow leaves etc will improve
- Chart passed around re improvement of absorption of elements available to plants at various pH levels
- White marks on the leaves, Bruno uses unsweetened pineapple juice to reduce pH
- Think about evolution of plants in native environments, and positioning in natural growing situations
- Bark is very acidic, so Paphiopedilums need adjustment because they prefer growing on limestone.

While presentation being prepared, Noel Grant showed a plant which had been positioned on a piece of tree fern and was flowering beautifully facing downwards, sometimes you cannot tell what they are going to do!

Presentation by Reg Dix - Cattleyas

(Note by the Editor – the following was all typed directly as Reg was speaking by Secretary Helen; isn't that amazing? Great work, Helen.)

- 2,786 species, 48,753 hybrids
- Explanation of highest points received by Burdekin Dream 'Roxanne', points of flower to notice
- Showing of work of breeders: Allan Eggins, Ron Grienke, Ross Maidment, Fred Clarke in US (Sunset Valley Orchids), spotted
- Can be potluck in what you can get from a large number of plants from the same breeding
- Bifoliate (Two leaves), Cattleyas can have canes like sugar canes
- Light can be from direct sunlight to dappled
- Air flow through root system important
- Roots must dry out between watering and fertilising
- Temperature ranges vary
- Do not use fertiliser with Urea
- Do use a mix of different fertilisers
- Do not water before hand
- 15L of water, 3 drops of phosphoric acid

- Yellow and blue, magnesium chelate, iron chelate
- Seasol, Nitrosol, Molasses, Seasol with growth hormone once a month
- Reg owns 160 orchids, 15 L is all needed for one watering
- Bifoliate need to have root growth before repot
- Noticed that potting mix being used was too wet for Townsville conditions, roots rotted, staying too wet
- Repotted all plants in LECA (lightweight expanded clay balls), with limestone chips on the top, no problem with roots rotting
- Sample showing of hangers for pots
- What healthy orchid roots look like, root is green, photosynthesis taking place, healthy orchid roots branching, microscopic view of orchid root and cross section
- Outside spongy piece (radicum) will absorb the first of the water which is up to 85% of what they need, water every three days
- Water when temperature is over 16 degrees, especially from 4 pm in the afternoon
- Common diseases include Fusarium, Black Spot etc, snails and slugs
- Dendrobium Beetle, Boisduval Scale, there are male and female, greatest problems, white furry growths on plants, repot the plant with the following hints but throw the pot out, use Fortune 500, soak the plant, leave out of pot for 3 weeks. Do not use methylated spirits as when it evaporates will damage leaves
- Control the amount of water, solar weave fabric is useful for this
- Reg having difficulty getting plants to flower, 5 growths after potting in Sept, video of greenhouse, all growing well but not flowering....
- Cattleya walkeriana as an example. The mean temperature during January this year was 33°C, with the lowest temperature being 28.6°C
- Resorted to technology, the temperature at midnight was 27.3°C, at 12.30 am it was 27.1°C, at 3 am it was 26°C, at 3.30 am it was 25.6°C but then by 7.00 am had risen back to 27.2°C
- OrchidWiz program was consulted, chose to look at Rth Memoria Warren Eggins
- Looked under cultivation, notes stated to grow between 14 and 24 degrees, Townsville too hot!
- GCT Barrel of Joy 'Pearl' mentions 18 to 28 degrees (as a hot grower) and it is flowering well
- The Cattleya Alliance grows mainly from South America, up to Florida and across to Cuba etc
- Orlando, 30 degrees north, same as bottom island of Japan which is equivalent to Merrimbula in NSW
- Examples of sea level originaters that will flower here
- So, suggestions ? pick up cattleyas and send south or position on top of Mt Stuart which is 5 degrees cooler?...
- Therefore conclusion is that temperature is just as important as light and fertiliser
- Bruno asked if we should water at 2 am in the morning, he does. Finds that allows for a long time to drip and water drops from leaves and calcium etc does not deposit on leaves, and flowering
- Home environment eg besser block and concrete will be hotter conditions and affect flowering
- Comment from member about moving plants across the region has affected flowering, has taken up to 7 years to reflower
- Revisit of Dendrobium beetle slides, grub form is most destructive, kill with two bricks or clapping of hands...
- Test flower who would check tag to flowering plant and be able to dispute....Charlie did...
